# CEO Report for the year ended 31 March 2024

# Aneeta Prem MBE JP CEO Annual Report

# Trigeminal Neuralgia Association UK (TNA UK)

As CEO of TNA UK, I am privileged to present this report. TNA UK has continued to make significant progress and become more resilient over this last year, despite the pressures caused by the cost-of-living crisis and increasing reliance on the services we provide. We have remained steadfast in our mission to reduce isolation, tackle misinformation, and deliver tailored support to those living with trigeminal neuralgia and facial pain (TNFP).

## 1. Member Engagement

- **TNFP Survey:** This year, we conducted one of our most extensive surveys, with over 570 responses-representing more than a quarter of our membership. The results highlighted waiting times, gaps in understanding, and the emotional toll of TNFP. These insights have been invaluable in shaping funding bids and informing our future priorities. We look forward to publishing the results to guide our continued work.

- **Regional Support Groups (RSGs):** During my travels across the country, I had the privilege of meeting members face-to-face at RSG meetings. I repeatedly heard how valuable these meetings are and how members hope to expand regular face-to-face gatherings a longside existing online RSG sessions.

- National Webinars: Hosting national webinars with internationally recognised experts has been a highlight of the year. These events provided vital advice on managing TNFP while addressing members' pressing concerns. Members' thoughtful contribut ions and questions shaped the discussions, making them highly practical and impactful.

# 2. Regular Member Updates

- Frequent Communications: Throughout the year, I sent regular updates to all members, sharing key developments, upcoming events, and the latest news in TNFP care. These updates have been described as invaluable, offering reassurance, connection, a nd reliable information.

- Strengthening Trust: Members consistently expressed how these updates reduced misinformation and strengthened their trust in TNA UK.

## 3. Rising Demand for Helpline Services

- **Increased Calls:** Calls to our freephone helpline, e-helpline, and Friendship Line have risen significantly this year, including a troubling increase in suicide-related cases, many of which were redirected to the Samaritans.

- Friendship Line Impact: One member shared: "I was completely alone with my TNFP. The pain was unbearable, and my family were fed up with me talking about it. Having someone from TNA call me once a week has given me hope, someone to talk to, and support. It's my lifeline."

Feedback like this highlights the critical role the Friendship Line plays in reducing isolation and providing emotional support, particularly for members who feel overlooked or alone.

- **Member Challenges:** The rise in demand reflects the immense pressures on members, worsened by the cost-of-living crisi s, which has intensified both emotional and financial hardships.

## 4. Advocacy and Representation

- Engaging Policymakers: This year, I met with ministers and MPs to raise awareness of the postcode lottery affecting TNFP treatment, advocating for reforms to Personal Independence Payments (PIP).

- Strengthening Influence: My appointment as a Trustee of The Neurological Alliance has amplified TNA UK's voice, enabling us to push for gr eater recognition of TNFP within healthcare policy.

- **Ongoing Advocacy:** We have continued our work with NHS leads, policymakers, and healthcare organisations to address systemic gaps, promote equitable treatment, and improve outcomes for those living with TNFP.

## 5. Medical Collaboration

- Partnering with Professionals: We strengthened relationships with neurologists, neurosurgeons, pain nurses, GPs, and dentists, equipping them with accurate, evidence-based information to improve care for TNFP patients.

- Educational Resources: Tailored resources have been distributed to healthcare professionals to combat misinformation and ensure TNFP is better understood and recognised.

- Medical Advisory Board: I am grateful for the leadership of our Medical Advisory Board, including Dr Giorgio Lambru and Mr Sinan Baraz i, who have provided invaluable expertise and guidance to our work.

## 6. Fundraising and Financial Stability

- Maintaining Financial Resilience: We maintained a healthy reserve to ensure continued service delivery during a year of uncertainty and rising demand.

- Securing Funding: A significant grant from a national provider has allowed us to expand critical initiatives and services.

- **Donate a Membership:** Through the generosity of our members, we have been able to provide complimentary memberships to those f acing financial hardship, ensuring inclusivity.

- Legacy Planning: I have worked closely with families and individuals on legacy planning, ensuring their contributions leave a lasting impact. One family expressed how their legacy gift brought them closer to our mission and gave them a renewed sense of purpose.

- Simplified Donations: The introduction of QR codes has made donating simpler and more accessible, boosting engagement and support.

# 7. Volunteer and Staff Development

- Volunteer Training: Comprehensive training programmes were delivered for helpline staff, RSG leaders, and Friendship Line volunt eers, ensuring they are well-equipped to provide compassionate, tailored support.

- New Volunteer and Fundraising Officer: This role has been pivotal in enhancing grassroots initiatives and fostering stronger supporter engagement.

- Expanding Volunteer Base: Actively recruiting new volunteers remains a priority to meet the increasing demand for our services.

- Heather Morris: As Finance and Membership Manager, Heather's contributions have been invaluable in maintaining accurate financial records and ensuring smooth membership support.

## 8. Digital Enhancements

- Updated Website: Our rebranded and refreshed website offers improved accessibility and clearer information, providing a vital r esource for members and healthcare professionals.

- Accessible Information: Medical updates, event details, and donation options are now easier to find and navigate, ensuring the website remains central to our outreach.

## 9. Media and Public Awareness

- Show TNFP 3 Fingers Campaign: Achieved an 80% increase in social media engagement, raising public awareness and strengthening community con nections.

- Short Film Collaboration: Partnered with an independent film company to produce a short film on hidden disabilities, praised for it s impactful storytelling and ability to highlight the challenges faced by those living with TNFP.

## 10. Challenges and Resilience

- **Cost-of-Living Crisis:** Many members have faced increased financial pressures, exacerbating the challenges of living with TNFP. We res ponded by expanding membership assistance and maintaining critical support services.

- Winter Pressures: The cold weather has worsened symptoms for many, further reinforcing the need for our tailored support.

- Volunteer Fatigue: Recognising this challenge, we provided additional support to sustain morale and maintain service quality.

## 11. Looking Ahead

Our goals for the year ahead include:

- Expanding the volunteer base and enhancing training programmes.
- Growing the Friendship Line and RSG network to further reduce isolation.
- Strengthening advocacy efforts to ensure TNFP care is prioritised within healthcare policy.
- Sustaining and diversifying fundraising initiatives to secure long-term financial stability.
- Driving forward collaborative research partnerships to improve outcomes for members.

## Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2024

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2024. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

As Chairman of TNA UK, it is my privilege to present this year's report. Despite the challenges posed by the cost-of-living crisis and increased demand for our services, TNA UK has continued to make a meaningful difference in the lives of those many individuals affected by trigeminal neuralgia (TN) and chronic facial pain.

The Trustees are responsible for ensuring that TNA UK operates in compliance with its charitable objectives and its legal obligations.

Throughout the year, we have conducted regular Board meetings to review performance, manage risks, and set strategic priorities. We have also reviewed and approved updated policies, which were developed by the CEO to reflect best practice and evolving member needs.

The Trustees have overseen the Charity's financial management, ensuring that resources are used efficiently and sustainably to maximise impact and to avoid risk by maintaining a healthy reserve. The Charity has been able to respond effectively to external challenges while maintaining transparency and accountability.

This year, TNA UK has made significant progress under the strategic direction of the Board. Membership has grown, thanks to initiatives such as the "Donate a Membership" scheme, which ensures inclusivity for those in financial hardship. Critical services such as the Friendship Line, national webinars, and the e-helpline have continued to provide valuable support to isolated members.

Our Charity's advocacy efforts have been strengthened through the CEO's appointment as a Trustee of The Neurological Alliance, enhancing TNA UK's national influence. We have continued to champion greater recognition of TN within healthcare policies and our demand for improvements in Personal Independence Payments (PIP) for those living with TN.

In difficult times TNA has maintained financial stability, sustained by members' contributions, donations and innovative fundraising initiatives, including "Tea for TNA". Legacy-giving campaigns will hopefully bolster the Charity's future financial resilience. The Trustees have fully supported the launch of a free will-writing service, empowering members to leave a lasting impact on the Charity's work.

We have been able to respond positively to new research ventures, including a proposed study into pain management. This demonstrates TNA UK's ongoing commitment to promoting the advancement of care.

Looking ahead, the Board's priorities include:

- Strengthening advocacy efforts to ensure TN is recognised as a priority condition in national healthcare policies.
- Supporting the growth of digital resources to engage a broader and younger audience.

- Expanding the range of fundraising initiatives to ensure the long-term sustainability of our services.

- Continuing to partner with medical experts to advance research, stay across the latest developments and improve outcomes for TN sufferers.

- Training our volunteers who generously provide their time and expertise to support those who suffer the devastating effects of TN

I would like to extend my sincere gratitude to our CEO, Aneeta Prem MBE JP, for her visionary leadership and tireless commitment to the Charity. I also wish to thank our dedicated staff, volunteers, and donors, whose efforts have enabled TNA UK to remain a lifeline for so many.

Together, we are building a stronger and more inclusive community for those living with trigeminal neuralgia and chronic facial pain.

## **Financial Review**

The results for the year are set out in the attached accounts. Total unrestricted funds at 31 March 2024 were £224,326 compared with £216,772 at 31 March 2023. Total income during the year was £203,684 (2023: £127,174) and total expenditure during the year was £148,749 (2023: £163,745).

# Report of the Trustees for the year ended 31 March 2024

In the past financial year, our charity has strategically invested beyond our projected budget. This overspend, while significant, was a conscious decision aligned with our long-term objectives. It encompassed vital areas such as research and development, event hosting, and enhancing our operational capabilities. These investments, including the scoping of new funding opportunities and upskilling our team, are fundamental to our growth and continued compliance with legal standards. Although partially offset by increased revenue from memberships and other sources, this expenditure represents our commitment to advancing our mission and ensuring our sustainability in the long term.

#### **Reserves Policy**

The trustees have decided that the amount of 'free' reserves (ie unrestricted reserves not designated as tangible assets) held by the charity should be maintained at a level equal to the approximate running costs of the charity for a twelve month period. This is estimated to be around £120,000.

#### **Risk Assessment**

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Trigeminal Neuralgia Association UK is exposed, in particular those related to its operation and finances, and are satisfied that sufficient systems and insurance policies are in place to mitigate exposure to major risks.

Our objective of providing advice and support to beneficiaries in vulnerable circumstances means that some exposure to risk is unavoidable, and cannot be predicted. We continue to take action and care to reduce such losses, but accept some degree of risk as incumbent on our core responsibility to provide our service to individuals living with extreme pain and mental anguish, often in isolated and chaotic situations.

Grants provided for research purposes are closely monitored and measured so that the charity can choose to focus its limited resources on support for projects most likely to bring optimum results.

#### Structure, governance and management

The charity is governed according to its Constitution and is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation, having been entered in the register of Charities on 13 December 2013.

#### 1. Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Trigeminal Neuralgia Association UK is a Charitable Incorporate Organisation (CIO) and is registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

#### Going concern

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. The trustees have reviewed and considered relevant information including future cash flows in making their assessment with regard to going concern. Based on their assessment and the current resources available, the trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern and have concluded that it is appropriate to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the preparing the financial statements.

## Key sources of estimation, uncertainty and judgement

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting practice requires management to make estimates and judgement that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities as well as the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the balance sheet date and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. The main source of estimation uncertainty is considered to be the calculation of depreciation. A full line by line review of fixed assets is carried out by management regularly. Whilst every attempt is made to ensure that the depreciation policy is as accurate as possible, there remains a risk that the policy does not match the useful life of the assets.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

### Tax reclaims on donations

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SOFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### **Governance costs**

Governance costs include the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings - 25% on cost

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

## **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives.

# **Fund accounting**

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

### **Debtors and creditors**
